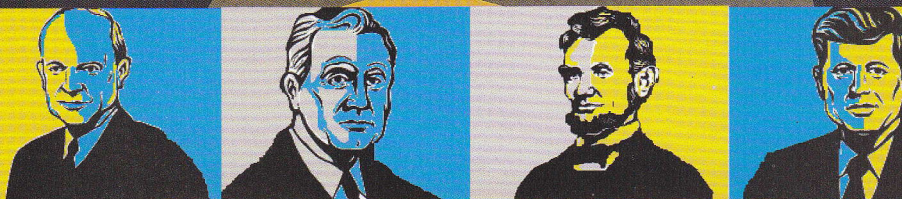
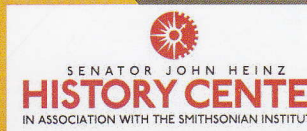

Speaker Biographies

Jonathan Harris, PhD Professor of Political Science and the Center for Russian and East European Studies, University Center for International Studies, University of Pittsburgh. Dr. Harris teaches courses in Soviet/Russian Foreign Policy, Comparative Politics, and the USSR/Russian Federation. His books include: *The Split in Stalin's Secretariat, 1939-1948* (2008) and *Subverting the System: Gorbachev's Reform of the Party's Apparatus, 1986-1991* (2004). He has also authored numerous articles and is editor of the Russian and East European Studies Series, University of Pittsburgh Press.

Warren F. Kimball, PhD Robert Treat Professor Emeritus, Rutgers University (NJ). He has written several books including *Forged in War: Roosevelt, Churchill, and the Second World War* (1997, 1998, 2003), *The Juggler: Franklin Roosevelt as Wartime Statesman* (1991, 1994), and books on the Morgenthau Plan and the origins of Lend-Lease, and edited *Churchill & Roosevelt: The Complete Correspondence* (3 vols., 1984). He has also published over 50 essays on Churchill, Roosevelt and the era of the Second World War. Dr. Kimball serves on the Board of Governors of the Roosevelt Institute and is an academic adviser to The Churchill Centre.

Louise Mayo, PhD Professor Emeritus and former History Department Chair, Morris College (NJ), is the author of several books including *A House Divided: America in the Era of Civil War and Reconstruction* (2003), *President James K. Polk: The Dark Horse President* (2006), and *The Ambivalent Image* (1988).

Manisha Sinha, PhD Associate Professor of Afro-American Studies, University of Massachusetts. Dr. Sinha was born in India and received her doctorate from Columbia University where her dissertation was nominated for the Bancroft prize. She is the author of *The Counterrevolution of Slavery* (2000) and co-editor of the two volume *African American Mosaic: A Documentary History from the African Slave Trade to the Twenty First Century* (2004) and *Contested Democracy: Freedom, Race and Power in American History* (2007). She is currently working on a book on African Americans and the movement to abolish slavery, 1775-1865.
